Ingesting sand

Top tip

Rinse toys regularly and offer fresh water to limit sand intake.



Swimming dangers

Not all dogs are natural swimmers and waves and currents can be dangerous.



Strong tides can exhaust dogs and pull them under.

Top tip

Keep them in shallow water and use a dog life vest.







Jellyfish can cause painful stings and dead



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Washed-up sea creatures may contain toxins harmful to dogs. fish may be poisonous.

Top tip

Keep your dog on a lead in areas where sea life is washed up.



Drinking salt water

Dogs often lap up seawater, which can lead to salt poisoning.

Risk

This can cause vomiting, diarrhoea, and dehydration.

Top tip

Bring plenty of fresh water and encourage frequent drinking.

Fishing hooks and foreign objects

Dogs are drawn to shiny

lures and smelly bait.





Swallowing a hook can cause severe internal injuries.

Top tip

Avoid areas where fishing is common and watch where they sniff.



Overexertion can lead to heatstroke, which is potentially fatal.

Visit the beach in cooler hours, bring shade, and check the sand temperature.





Running on hot sand can burn paw pads.





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
